Presbyterian Corner Our faith, our practice, and our roots

In what ways does the Holy Spirit work in the church?

Presbyterians believe the Holy Spirit is active in the church as well as in our personal lives. Theologically, the Spirit works in sanctification, our growth in Christian faith and life (2 Thess. 2:13: 1Cor. 6:11). As we mature in the faith, we perceive the Holy Spirit at work. When the church carries out its mission and ministries in the world, we see the Spirit in tremendously energetic! The Spirit brings us to faith in Christ for salvation, unites us with Christ, and calls the church together as the people of God. The ongoing work of the Spirit is to lead and guide Christians believers in the church while equipping us to serve as Christ's disciples in the world.

In short, the Holy Spirit sustains us in carrying out Christ's ministry. The Spirit equips the church with "gifts" to enable our ministries (1 Cor. 12:4-11). The Spirit leads us into ways of services to enact Christ's forgiving, reconciling, liberating, and compassionate word. The Spirit enables love to be shared (Gal. 5:22; Rom. 5:5). The Spirit makes the characteristics of God's kingdom present realities: righteousness, peace, and joy (Rom. 14:17; 8:6). Presbyterians recognize the full range of the Holy Spirit's activities, both inside and outside the church. This make Christian life exciting! We never know what direction the Spirit will prompt us toward, or into what new ministries the Spirit will lead us. Our joy in being obedient to God (Act. 5:32) is strengthened by the assurance that we are the children of God (Rom. 8:14) and live in the "communion" of the Holy Spirit (2 Cor. 13:13). We participate in the Spirit's activities as the Spirit uses us to be the means of representing the reign of God in the world by the church's proclamation, fellowship, and service. The Spirit unifies the church in Jesus Christ (Eph. 4:5) and enables us to continue our ministries with joy, even in the midst of persecution (Thess. 1:6). The Spirit help us in prayer (Rom. 8:26-27), and the Spirit's presence with us help us anticipate the glorious future that God has prepared (2 Cor. 1:22; Rom. 8:17).

So Presbyterians are people of the Spirit! We are sustained by the Spirit, rely on the Spirit, and are led by the Spirit. We have the hope that "does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us" (Rom. 5:5).

Operation Christmas Child Starter Kit

Due to Covid 19 restrictions we will not be able to gather together this year to pack shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child. We hope that you will participate in this activity as a family and return your box to Calvary (or request pick up).

Directions: Pick up a bag of items to place in your Operation Christmas Child box at Calvary on Sunday, or request delivery to your home. (Contact the church office for a delivery). The starter kit will be marked with the gender and age of the child. We encourage you to place these items in the box and then supplement the box with other items that you feel this child would enjoy. There is a list of suggested items for these children—but do not let this limit you.

You may want to include a letter to the child. While many of children do not speak English, there are often Samaritan's Purse volunteers who can translate the letter.

You may also include a photo. Do not include your address as these children will not correspond back to you.

Please pray for the child who will receive this box.

Do **NOT** include: **Food** (including candy)

Liquids (no hand sanitizer, liquid soap, toothpaste, snow globes)

Weapons, or toys shaped like weapons. Scissors are OK.

When you are done you may:

Bring the box back to church

Deliver the box to Liz Daley's porch (2028 La France Ave)

Call Liz for pick up from your house (626-487-3741)

Boxes need to be at delivered or picked up by Sunday, November 15th

If possible, please attach a check for \$9 for each box. (Made out to Calvary Presbyterian Church) This is the processing and shipping fee. The fee will be paid online so that we can track where our boxes are sent.


OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD SHOEBOX


We do this by practicing what we believe.

Jesus and the Disinherited

I am currently taking a class at Claremont School of Theology on Christian Ethics. One book we are required to read for the class is by pastor and theologian Howard Thurman. For those who don't know about Thurman, he is the single greatest influence of Martin Luther King. It is often said that wherever King went, he took his copy of *Jesus and the Disinherited*, and the bible, with him.

Jesus and the Disinherited by Howard Thurman is an

incredible book on suffering and oppression and what the Christian message has to say about it. It's a short book (barely 70 pages) but it's packed with so much goodness. The main question that Thurman tries to answer is the question of suffering for the poor and the oppressed. He wrote:

"The masses of men live with their backs constantly against the wall. They are the poor, the disinherited, the dispossessed. What does our religion say to them? The issue is not what it counsels them to do for others whose need maybe greater, but what religion offers to meet their own needs. The search for an answer to this question is **perhaps the most important religious quest of modern life.**"

And I agree. What does our Presbyterian faith have to say to those whose backs are against the wall? Thurman argues that the poor and the oppressed are "constantly given a negative answer to the most important personal questions upon which mental health depends: "Who am I? What am I?" When systemic racism and police brutality make people of color feel inferior, it is very difficult to overcome that. Thurman states that the solution is to rest in the fact that one is a child of God for he believes that the "awareness of being a child of God tends to stabilize the ego and results in a new courage, fearlessness, and power." Holding a conviction that we are children of God changes everything. Believing deeply in God's love and care allows us to endure what seems insurmountable. I highly recommend this book to everyone, no matter where you are on your Christian journey and no matter what you believe politically.
