Our faith, our practice, and our roots

What is the meaning of the cross?

Presbyterians affirm that there is no one meaning to the cross of Christ. The cross is the focus of Christian faith because we believe it points to the inexhaustible riches of God's love. No words can capture all it means. No images or theories adequately convey its fullness and significance for the world and for each of us.

Yet theologians (of course!) have tried to say what the cross means. Theologically, the death of Jesus Christ on the cross is called the "atonement." This term means God and humanity are made "atone" through the offering of Jesus, who died for us (1Thess. 5:9-10). The Christian church has never said there is only one "correct" view of the atonement. Some important ways of understanding the meaning of the cross are:

Christ Is Victor. In his death on the cross, Christ won victory over the power that enslave humanity: sin, death, and Satan. Christ offers himself as the sinless sacrifice. It appears that evil was victorious on the cross, but God raised Christ in the resurrection and thus defeated the evil "rulers and authorities" by "triumphing over death" (Col.2:15).

Satisfaction for sin. A key theory of the atonement in Western Christianity see the cross as the place where Christ satisfied God's law and justice. Sinful humans stand guilty before God and cannot save themselves. Only one who is perfectly obedient to God and cannot laws and is sinless, could offer himself as a substitute for sinners, to justify them in God's sight. Jesus, the sinless Son of God, died on the cross to fulfill the demands of God's law, justice and even wrath against sin (Rom. 5:18-21). Now God sees sinners through the righteousness of Christ.

Example to Follow. An alternative view stresses not a change in how God views sinners as a result of Christ's death, but now the cross is the supreme example of God's suffering love and the power of God's goodness to triumph over sin.

When we see the depths of God's love by looking at the cross, we are awakened, desire to forsake sin, and achieve reconciliation with God by determining to live with Christ as our example and showing similar love to others (1 John 4:11). Jesus is the most profound demonstration of God's vast love, and profoundly changes our lives.

The cross of Christ can mean different things to us at different points in our lives. We will never exhaust its richness. Regardless of what theological view one holds, we affirm with the hymn writer Isaac Watts that in the cross we find "Love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all."



Lincoln's Theology

Our thirteenth president was a practical theologian. His administration encompassed the most brutal and monumental four years of war that this nation has ever experienced. How does one view God's action in the midst of such wanton destruction and death perpetrated between fellow Americans? The goal of the North was to maintain a united country, north and south. The goal of the South was to create a new nation in which chattel slavery of imported Africans and their progeny would be preserved. Yet both sides were Christian and committed to the same Bible as sacred words from God. Both believed God answers their prayers.

In Lincoln's Second Inaugural Address he said that both sides read the same Bible and prayed to the same God for victory against the other. But God could not answer both prayers. Lincoln intimates that both were missing something essential about the nature of God. He said that we mortals are just not that privy to the mind of God. And, perhaps, the more we are sure we know God's intentions for earthly events, the more off the mark we are.

In all that, though, Lincoln believed God was righteous—that God was a God of Love. No matter the brutality, mindless killing, and destruction of property that came with war, God would have us act "With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in, to bind up the nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan, to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations."

Lincoln's desire for love and grace to prevail in dealing in the aftermath of war did not prevail. Revenge on the part of the North and resistance on the part of the White South held strong sway for about fourteen years. In 1877 the North and the White South made political nice with each other at the expense of African Americans. We are still dealing with the aftermath of that compromise.

Today we find our country sharply divided into impenetrable camps, each despising the other. We have the choice to repeat history and use whatever political, social, or religious means to help our side win. Or, we could take Lincoln's advice and regard all people as God's people and bind up the wounds, verbal and otherwise, that we have inflicted on each other. We can care for those on the margins who are in need. We can make peace our goal, not through beating our enemy, but by putting away the malice we harbor toward others and replacing it with love for all. This is a tall order, but one that fits the nature of the God we worship. In the end is the kind of practical theology Lincoln advocated.




The needs continue for L-5X clothing for men and we could use some baby shampoo and bath products and infant socks.


