Will non-Christians be saved?

Presbyterians should always maintain that who saved is decided solely by God. This is a basic theology: God is free. God is free to give salvation to whomever God chooses. We believe this about election and predestination. We are saved only and solely by God's gracious choosing. We acknowledge that salvation belongs to God. Jesus commands us not to "judge" on these matters (Matt. 7:1). So, we ourselves do not know who will be saved.

At the same time, there are other theological perspectives to keep in mind.

First, salvation comes through faith in Jesus Christ (2 Tim. 3:15; 2:10: 1Thess. 5:9). This is the basic message of the gospel, Jesus said: "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6). So, as Presbyterian Christians, we proclaim vigorously and persuasively that we come to salvation through Jesus Christ, God's Son, who was sent to save the world (John 3:16) and bring the benefits of salvation to all (Luck 3:6. Titus 2:11). Proclaiming the evangelical message is always imperative for us.

At the same time, we recognize God is free to give salvation in whatever way God chooses. Ultimately, we do not know for certain how God chooses to administer salvation in relation to those who have never heard the Christian gospel, those who have rejected the Christian gospel, or those of other religion faiths that do not perceive Jesus the same as we Christians do. God's freedom in relation to salvation is basic and necessary. We cannot prescribe to God that God either must or must not save any person.

A third point to remember is that the Holy Spirit works more widely than we know. The wind of God's Spirit, said Jesus, "blows where it chooses" (John 3:8). We do not and cannot know those with whom and in whom the spirit of God is at work.

The result of these perspectives is that Presbyterian Christians preach the gospel of Jesus Christ for salvation as energetically as possible, calling all people to faith in Jesus. We do so while acknowledging God is free and is at work in ways we cannot know. We also remember the major intention of God, who "desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Tim. 2:4).

Reflections with Reece: Categories



One day Jesus was teaching at the temple when a group of "Scribes" (interpreters of the law) and "Pharisees" (moral separatists) came to him dragging a woman before him. They said, "This woman was caught in the very act of adultery! The law of Moses says that we should stone her to death; What do you say?"

Now they did this in order to test Jesus so that they might "accuse" (Greek: Kata-gor-ey-oh) him.

- 1. They wanted to test him: If he had said, "Let her go", they could say that he does not uphold their religious laws. If he said, "stone her", he would be breaking Roman law which required a hearing with the Roman authorities first. They had him now! What could he do?
- 2. They wanted to "Accuse" him. The Greek is so interesting to me. The word is Katagoreo. Said out loud, you can hear it in English...category-oh. They wanted to "Categorize" Jesus. Was he with them or against them? Interestingly, the Greek synonyms include the word "diabolos" from which we get the Latin word "diablo" or in English, "devil". The devil is known all throughout Scripture as "the Accuser". To Kategoreo is to openly accuse, to diaballo is to secretly accuse. In this instance, although the Scribes and Pharisees wanted to make a public accusation, they were keeping their motives secret and were acting "diabolically". Later in the same chapter, Jesus calls these guys sons of the devil.

Ouch! Jesus, instead of answering them, bends down and begins to write something on the ground. But they persisted. So Jesus straightened up and answered them with these famous and all too often forgotten words;

"Let whoever is here, who is sinless, throw the first stone!" He then knelt down and began to write in the dirt again.

One by one, the stones began dropping to the ground as these "righteous", religious men also left, one by one. Interestingly we are told that the oldest left first. Maybe the young waited because the elders in a tribal culture always took the lead. Maybe it was because the elders were wise enough to realize they had been beaten. Maybe time had taught them, that they had not been able to defeat sin in their own life. Regardless, they all left.

So Jesus is alone with this adulterous woman, this hated sinner, this pawn in an ugly religious and political game.

He says to her, "woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?" "No one", she said "Then I don't condemn you either...go and stop your sinning." (Now I am writing this through tears)

There was only one person at the scene who had the right to throw a stone.

Only one man in the crowd was sin free.

He did not throw it.

Religious people can get pretty caught up on the *rules*. We can jump directly to accusations, passing judgment and categorizing people. But the one we confess as our Lord, literally our Master, graciously made it clear that this was not our place.

<u>Jesus</u>, in an impossible trap, made a way for all of the sinners in the scene, to leave their sin behind and go, without anyone getting hurt.

Are we not expected to live in the same way? Dealing with everyone's sins is not the call of the disciple of Jesus. Jesus is more than able to deal with the sins of the world (ours included). Isn't that why he came? Put down your stones. Leave your life of sin. Let's stop trying to categorize everyone. Let's avoid being like "The Accuser". Rather we can be like Jesus who is by nature and name, "the Redeemer".



August 23 | Middle Eastern Concerns

To begin the Week of Action, we will focus our attention on the multi-faceted concerns facing our Middle Eastern siblings. In connection to this multi-layered and rich part of the world, we will examine some of the issues in the region that directly impact the oppression experienced by marginalized people as well as the places where liberation are evident. The day will include story time for kids, a discussion on important issues, and varying facts about existing concerns. Participants will be weighing in from the U.S. as well as differing parts of the Middle Eastern region.

August 24 | Latinx Community Pride & Systemic and Racialized Poverty

Tuesday will center voices from the Latinx and Hispanic community. We will uplift the richness of culture that inform the resistance and liberation within the Latinx context. We will also bring light to the deeper realities of oppression faced by many of Latinx and Hispanic origin.

Join together to learn more about systemic, racialized poverty in the United States. We plan to gather together on zoom to connect to the Poor People's Campaign and other actions and campaigns to engage nationally and in our own context.

August 25 | LGBTQIA+ Resilience

A day dedicated to celebrating and honoring the resilience our queer siblings both past and present. The day includes a live stream morning chapel service led and planned by LGBTQIA+ community members. Drag Storytime featuring children's literature from Flyaway Books and the best Drag Kings and Queens in the PC(USA) will definitely be a highlight of the day. Finally, a live stream Story & Poetry Slam featuring live and pre-recorded LGBTQIA+ community members and allies sharing their own words and wisdom will round out the day's events. Look for "Did you Know?" facts on social media related to LGBTQIA+ history and advocacy throughout the day.

August 26 | Murdered Missing Indigenous Women, Girls and Two-Spirit People

Thursday of the Week of Action will create intentional space for navigating the difficult reality of Murdered Missing Indigenous Women, Girls and Two-Spirit People. On that day, there will be multiple publications (i.e., a resource page that will include educational material and liturgy resources, statements from Indigenous women from across the continents known as North and South America) in addition to releasing digital content on social media. Plans are to provide an opportunity to advocate for legislation that will help address this reality.

August 27 | Ending AAPI Hate

Although there has been a significant rise in the number of physical attacks of AAPI siblings in the United States, during the last year and a half, the racist and xenophobic history of violence and hatred against AAPI women, girls, men, boys, and non-binary people did not begin with the onset of the coronavirus pandemic. It has been a long painful, shameful, and sinful history. On Friday, August 27, 2021, we will raise awareness, develop strategies and action steps toward Ending AAPI Hate. Using storytelling, historical inquiry, and multiple forms of media we will engage themes and issues ranging from the state of AAPI communities to AAPI Intersections to Cross-Identity Solidarity as well as honor and reflect on the lives lost at the hands of AAPI hatred and violence, and more. Eradicating racism is the work of the community of God. Together we can celebrate the rich heritage and diversity of AAPI siblings. As we deepen and expand our knowledge and understanding, we can work together to advocate for ending discrimination and violence against AAPI siblings and begin the process toward repairing and healing over two centuries of pain and trauma.

August 28 | Black Lives Matter

We believe and affirm that Black Lives have, do, and will always Matter. It is a continued priority to uplift the concerns, champions the victories, and center the voices of all our Black siblings. During the Week of Action, Saturday will be devoted to uplifting some the oppressive issues within the Black community as well as highlighting where resistance to injustice is happening and how liberation is a continuing reality. Throughout the day there will be a diversity of activities. The goal of this day is to raise awareness, highlight resistance to oppression, and champion the on-going efforts of equity & liberation.



Walking the Bridgeless Canyon:

Repairing the Breach between the Church and the LGBT Community

One of the greatest women in recent church history is an evangelical Christian named Kathy Baldock. While on a hike, Kathy came across a woman she saw each time she hiked her favorite

trail near her home in New Mexico. They quickly became friends and Kathy learned that her hiking budy happened to be a lesbian. Having been taught to believe that LGBT people were outside of God's will, Kathy was a bit apprehensive about hiking with her. But overtime, God used Kathy's hiking buddy to inspire her to do some of her own research on why pastors were preaching an anti-LGBT interpretation of the Bible.



Kathy's research led her down the rabbit whole of American politics, American history and the history of bible translations. Kathy put all of her research together in a book titled "Walking the Bridgeless Canyon: Repairing the Breach between the Church

and the LGBT Community." In her book, Kathy wrote about the evolution of our cultural understanding of sexual orientation. She also wrote the history of religion and politics and explained how politicians used an anti-LGBT agenda to get people





into voting booths. She debunks the science around this issue as well as how we understand LGBT relationships in the bible. And then she

outlines current issues of harm occurring in churches today including conversion therapy and how people try to "fix" gay people. Kathy's book is amazing, and no matter what you believe about this issue, I cannot, cannot recommend this book enough.

I met Kathy when she came to my church a couple of years ago. She came to give her 2 day lecture on homosexuality and the Bible – and her lectures are amazing. I have seen her lecture 3 times and each time it heals old wounds and deepens my faith. I want to encourage you to check out her lectures on YouTube. They are a couple of hours long but

provide excellent commentary on the Bible and the LGBT community. If this important to you and you would like to discuss it more, please feel free to to me. I would love to talk with you.

We were especially inspired by the many testimonies of youth, the same age as our tapestry teens.

On Wednesday we visited with Rev. Lisa Hansen at Pasadena Presbyterian Church. We got the opportunity to help her assemble 45 bags of lunch, each filled with two bottles of water, cookies, fruit, chips and a peanut butter and jelly sandwich. Our teens helped make the sandwiches. Pasadena Presbyterian Church has an amazing homeless ministry that serves their surrounding community.





On Wednesday we also heard from Kristi Van Nostran. Kristi is the Immigrant Accompaniment Ministry Coordinator for both Riverside and San Gabriel Presbyteries. Before this current ministry, she was a PC USA Mission Co-Worker in El Salvador.

On Thursday we visited the San Francisco House at Crossroads Inc. in Pomona. Crossroads is a ministry dear to the hearts of so many at Calvary. Crossroads helps so many formerly incarcerated women get rehabilitated back into society.

Each day, we a youth leader gave a talk on John 15 on what it meant to be "Rooted in Christ." We were so fortunate to hear from Rev. Brian, Rev. Erin from Calvary in Riverside, Natalie Day, the new Director of Children and Youth at San Marino Community Church and from Ashley.



We learned about what it meant to be chosen and the agency we have in the choosing process. We also learned about what it means to be "pruned" by God and how difficult but important that experience truly is if we want to grow.

We are so grateful for the chance to travel, to serve our community and to do so in-person. May God bless you with a spirit of service as you think about how you may grow in your own personal relationship with Christ.


