Why is the church so full of "sinners"?

The church is full of sinners because the church is *for* sinners. The New Testament picture of the church does not "touch up the negatives" when it comes to portraying what the earliest Christian churches were like. When we read the letters of the apostle Paul to the "saints" (Eph. 1:1;Col 1:2) in all the various churches, we find that he is always addressing difficulties that have emerged. Sometimes these relate to the practices of the churches, sometimes to their beliefs, and sometimes to the personalities of people who were having squabbles or acting in unchristian ways (Phil. 4:2). Paul's theological insights had to be brought to bear on the very real problems of churches, no the least of which was that church members were not believing or behaving as he believed Christians should. They were sinners.

This is not surprising if, as Presbyterians, we recognize that Christians are "forgiving sinners." We are saved by God's grace in Jesus Christ, not by human "works" (Eph. 2:8-9). But our salvation does not bring us perfection. We will not live a perfect Christian life. We will sin, even as Christians. Paul himself struggled with this in his own life. Hear his agony when he confessed to the church at Rome: "For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do" (Rom. 7:19). Christians are saved by God's grace on Christ, but we are still sinners. Yet now, as Christians, we seek and find forgiveness through Christ.

The Christian church is the community of sinners who are saved by God's grace, and yet who stand in continuing need of God's gracious forgiveness in Christ and of the loving forgiveness of others against whom we sin. Church quarrels, schisms, hypocrisy, and failures to be Christlike are marks of churches, as anyone who is a church member can testify. Yet it is precisely here where God's grace can still abound. It is in the community of faith that sins can be confessed and forgiveness and reconciliation offered. There is a realism to our view of the church. We are church members, sinful though we be. But we are sinners who are saved by grace.


This is one way we live our mission as a Hunger Care Congregation.

Unafraid: Living with Courage and Hope in Uncertain TImes By Adam Hamilton

With the rise of the Omicron variant and the NHL postponing their season, it feels like the beginning of 2020 all over again. We are very much still living in a global pandemic. It is very easy to get overwhelmed and discouraged and to let go of hope in such a consistently difficult time.

To encourage your faith, I want to recommend to you "Unafraid" by Adam Hamilton. For those who are unfamiliar with Hamilton, he is the senior pastor of <u>Church of the Resurrection</u> in Kansas City. The church has about 20,000 members and is the largest United Methodist Church in our country. He is a wonderful author and does a great job at making difficult (and hard to swallow) concepts easy to consider.



In his book "Unafraid," Hamilton sheds light on understanding fear and how the social issues of our day are contributing to that fear through the media. He also talks about how we can have faith in the midst of loneliness and life's disappointments. For anyone concerned about the financial market, Hamilton has a few chapters on unpacking our dystopian outlook. Hamilton also talks about the very human experience of aging and dying, encouraging readers to have faith in the sovereign care of our Creator.

Adam Hamilton's book, "Unafraid" is a good book for anyone needing encouragement or for anyone struggling to find hope. Even When God is Silent

In the gospel of John there is a famous story about two sisters named Mary and Martha, and their

brother Lazarus. You may remember Mary and Martha from when Jesus came to town. Martha hosted Jesus and the disciples in "her home." Martha was "distracted by many tasks" – probably busy with food preparation, with clean up and with hosting – she felt like she had no actual time to sit and listen to Jesus. But her sister, Mary, more at peace with unfinished tasks, sat at Jesus' feet, simply to hear his words.



Those two sisters had a brother named Lazarus and when Lazarus became sick, his sisters sent a message to Jesus, begging him to come. They told him that "he whom you love is ill." He's sick. Lazarus is dying. Please come.

Jesus replied, "this illness does not lead to death [but] rather it is for God's glory."

After two days, Jesus decided to travel to Bethany to meet with Mary, Martha and Lazarus but by the time he arrived, Lazarus was dead. Lazarus had been in the tomb for four whole days. When Martha heard about Jesus' arrival, she went up to Jesus and in her grief and in her sadness and dare I say, in her ANGER, she said to Jesus, "IF YOU had been here, my brother

would not have died." IF YOU had been there...

When her sister Mary found Jesus, she said the same thing: "If you had been here, my brother would not have died." At the sight of their tears and grief and their overwhelming pain, Jesus wept. The text says Jesus was "greatly disturbed in spirit." Jesus wept.

The son of God wept over the pain these two women held in their hearts. Jesus wept over the pain that comes from the indescribable loss we experience in the death of a loved one.

Some people said, "See how he loved him!" Others said, "Could NOT HE who opened the eyes

of the blind man HAVE KEPT this man from dying?"

How many of us have ever felt that way? If Jesus was only there... if God had intervened... this NEVER would have happened.

We sometimes think that pain and suffering means that God is gone. That God does not care.

That God has abdicated God's throne. In our grief and in our pain, we are tempted to believe that God somehow, abandoned us.

Nothing could be further from the truth.

Jesus wept at the sight of Mary and Martha's grief, demonstrating to them that he was not ambivalent to their searing loss. He felt it too. The Son of God felt their pain and the Son of God feels your pain too.

Maybe you are beginning 2022, struggling to endure a searing loss. Maybe it's the loss of a loved one or the loss of a job or a life you once had. Maybe you are dealing with physical ailments, a sickness that won't go away. No matter what you are going through, God is here with you, feeling your pain and your anguish too.

God is here, even when God is silent. God is at work, making all things work out together for good – even when God seems late.

The birth of Christ means that our suffering and our pain is never the end of the story. Because of Christ, there is redemption, resurrection, and everlasting hope.

In the case of Lazarus, Jesus raised him from the dead, bringing healing to a whole community. In our lives, redemption and healing look different and it looks different for all of us.

Through the prophet Joel, God gave Israel this promise. "I will restore the years the locusts of have eaten," Joel 2:25. In other words, God promises to restore the years that pain and suffering have eaten. We can count on this promise because of Jesus, because of the birth of our Messiah, because God has already fulfilled God's promise to redeem us through Christ.


